Dean's letter

Someone once asked the great Anglican monastic theologian Herbert Kelly this question: 'How do we know what the will of God is?' to which he famously answered, 'We don't. That's the joke.'

Kelly is right: we can't know precisely what God's will is in a certain situation. But we can open up opportunities for God to 'come through' our actions, and building community is a key way of doing this. In any situation we can try and tune our lives a bit more to God. And across our diocese our commitment to our communities is key to this.

So, when we meet people, a simple smile shows the person before us we see them as a friend. This is not to suggest ignorance or naivety. We are not unaware of the limitations and imperfections of a person, but we are prepared to focus more deeply, to the depths of the heart in each person. To seek out the goodness that only love and trust can bring to birth.

As a Cistercian writer recently put it: 'Let us welcome each person as Christ, because in all truth it is Christ whom we welcome. 'You did this to me' (Matthew 25). Let us look for the beloved face of Christ in each person, for each is his true face.'

But why start our focus on community, with those around us, and not God? Good question. Perhaps it is best explained by a lovely saying from the Desert Father, John the Dwarf: 'You don't build a house by starting with the roof and working down. You start with the foundation.'

They said, 'What does that mean?'

He said, 'The foundation is our neighbour whom we must win. The neighbour is where we start. Every commandment of Christ depends on this.'

Every six years, each of our churches are required to completely renew our electoral rolls. These are the lists of people who are entitled to vote in the elections for PCC members. To be on the electoral roll you need to be baptised, over 16, resident in the parish or habitually attend worship in each church.

Recipe

Mustard Sauce

This was known as Grannie's Special Mustard Sauce by the girls, not my sauce but my Mums.

It is really simple and is good with Gammon, baked ham, sausages, etc. it keeps well in the fridge for a few days in a lidded jar. I have never tried to reheat it but it is good cold as well and I have yet to try freezing it.

Mustard Sauce

1 egg

2fl ozs water (last time I used the apple juice I had cooked the ham in the slow cooker as an experiment and it was very good! 2fl ozs vinegar, any sort you fancy

2 tablespoons sugar

1 tablespoon dry mustard

1/2 oz butter or spread

Salt to taste

Put everything in a small saucepan and blend with a stick blender, or liquidise, or whisk briskly, till smooth but I find the blender works best.

Cook gently stirring till thick and smooth.

Done! Simplest yet I think and I hope you enjoy.

When we returned to England both my Primary and Secondary schools had swimming pools and we frequented the Beau Street Baths, and The Cleveland Baths, in Bath.

Our children Michael and Sarah, graduated through swimming lessons, Frome Swimming Club, and swimming was an activity we all loved in as a family and participated in at various levels.

Michael and Sarah are continuing this model with their own families.

Whenever I get an opportunity to, I swim in the sea!

My greatest love is swimming at Vobster Quay which is a renowned diving center, paddle board venue and open water swimming facility.

In 2023 I completed an Open Water Swimming Lifesaving Course and now regularly lifeguard at the venue too!

In June this year I went on a boat trip to Lundy Island where we donned our wetsuits, fins, snorkels and masks and swam with seals and puffins. It was a truly amazing experience! Can you imagine coming face to face with a seal, whilst another one is nibbling your fins?

Anna Chaplaincy

In October last year, Anna Chaplaincy started ministry in Frome with a small band of people consisting of one Anna Chaplain (Len Taylor) and three Anna friends (Anthea Kemp and Chris and Miriam Hare).

The Anna Chaplaincy was started in Alton, Hampshire back in 2009 by TV presenter and broadcaster Debbie Thrower. Her parents were not in the best of health and she realised that older people that were infirm or unable to get out were not always receiving the spiritual comfort that they had when they were more able bodied and able to attend church services with the fellowship that comes with it. Within a fairly short time Debbie realised that this was far more wide spread than she initially thought and one of the reasons behind it was due to cut backs within the Church of England leading to the decline in clergy numbers. Along with the extra workload put upon remaining clergy leading to clergy not having nearly enough time for pastoral ministry within their parishes. In 2014 Debbie had a meeting with the Bible Readers Fellowship (BRF) who in their wisdom along with Debbie formulated what is now known as the Anna Chaplaincy ministry. Back then Debbie was the only Anna Chaplain in the country. Fast forward 10 years there are now over 400 Anna Chaplains operating country wide from the Isle of Wight all the way up to the Orkney islands, also across the breadth of the country. Along with the Chaplains there are hundreds of Anna Friends working along side the Chaplains and in some cases individually.

All Anna Chaplains and Friends are fully trained and licenced. The diocese in which they operate. Their diocese hold the full licence with the Chaplains holding and operating on a sub licence. As from January 2025 BRF are reviewing their working practices and have decided that newly commissioned Anna Friends do not need to hold a licence.

All Chaplains have the agreement of their PCC and are also answerable to a "line leader" my line leader is Reverend Liz Dudley, this ensures that there is a chain of accountability all the way to the Bishop of Bath and Wells in my case.

In the last few months Reverend Harry Wainwright Anthea and myself are now holding regular worship and pastoral visits in both Belmont villas and Critchill court care homes. We have both been amazed and humbled at the warmth and love that we have received from residents and staff, with the residents in both homes now looking forward to their monthly service and our pastoral visits, while Chris and Miriam are continuing their work in Rowden house and Rossetti care homes under the "Prayer for care homes and Anna friends" banner. At this moment in time I am not too sure whether Catherine court and Frome care village have any regular spiritual input!

We have purposely started off slowly to gradually feel the lay of the land and iron out any niggles along the way. This year I hope to promote Anna Chaplaincy in and around Frome and in the wider deanery as well. I would like to see both Catherine court and Frome Care village have regular services and pastoral visits before moving farther afield.

To do this more volunteers would be required. I would ask that if you feel a calling to this wonderful ministry firstly Google "Anna Chaplaincy" and have a look at their very informative web site.

Our diocese Anna Chaplain lead is Mrs Wendy Haslam and of course you can contact myself in the first instance.

I would like to finish by saying that this article is a very brief insight to Anna Chaplaincy. However I have found over these past four months a "new lese of life or if you like a spring in my step".

Seeing the joy on residents faces when we arrive for service or visits. Another thing that is beginning to flourish is the conversations with the residents, albeit a little slow to begin with, now the ice has been broken and friendships beginning to form we are talking about their lives, hearing some wonderful accounts, and sometimes sadness of times gone by and of

course the occasional bit of silliness of which as many of you know I am very well versed.

Just to see a smile on their faces is for me a sign of a worthwhile visit.

Lastly the Anna Chaplaincy ministry also helps support and take a little bit of weight off our vicars shoulders allowing for a more consistent outreach in the parishes as well as working with and alongside other existing groups and agencies.



So did you find any crumbs?



There is a recurrent theme of Christmas throughout the story, set in a rundown, stately family home, and includes descriptions of all the trimmings that go with the Christmas period!



2025 - Happy New Year - planning for the future

Happy New Year! January was an ideal time for members of the PCCs to accept the Vicar's invitation to meet in St Mary's Hall to tell the story of our churches, to look at where we are and identify the next steps.

In the market town of Frome, the opening Lectio was particularly appropriate:

'Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread and your labour for that which does not satisfy?'

Making a time-line engaged everyone's attention.

Where did we come from? What were the origins of Christianity and the churches in Frome? What were the highlights for us and for those who went before us and what impact have events had on the growing community and on our own lives?

We considered and discussed the challenges and opportunities facing us in 2025:

'For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.'

We were reminded that with the Grace of God, we are in His hands. We need to be proactive and take responsibility for the future and always to remember in all we do: 'Love God and love your neighbour as yourself.'

'For you shall go out in joy and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands. Instead of the thorn, shall come up the Cypress; instead of the brier shall come up the Myrtle; and it shall be to the Lord for a memorial, for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off.'

We wove silky strips in different colours through the net to symbolise the flow of faith from Biblical times through the ages. They link past, present and future, times of jubilation and plenty with times when days were dark. We are reminded of the interconnectedness of all things. We are a living part of God's Creation; the love of God will always be with us, with those who went before and those who will follow.

The charts and comments will be put up for future conversations and further consideration. How can we best share our resources and buildings, skills and energies as Christians in Frome? It is a question that requires our concerted attention in the days ahead.
